The workshop was hands-on and interactive, providing ample opportunities for discussions and questions, and to apply what we learned through assignments and developing our own case drafts. The workshop was designed to facilitate peer collaboration and the receipt of constructive feedback, which were integral parts of enriching the learning process and experience.

Overall, the case writing workshop has been a rewarding personal and professional development experience which not only contributed to enhancing my enterprise pedagogical practice, but also reinforced my interest for innovative pedagogical methods.
